



Information for Spouses or Partners at Duke

DUKECARD FOR SPOUSES

The DukeCard is available for spouses of full-time **undergraduate students, graduate students, and Duke employees only**. Spouses of visiting scholars *are not eligible* for a DukeCard, but you may purchase a library card. See below for more information. *The DukeCard gives you access to the Gyms, Tennis Courts, Swimming Pools, Taking books out from the libraries, & certain parking lots (after 5 pm Monday-Friday and all day on weekends).*

- To obtain a Spouses DukeCard, you need to go to **the DukeCard website**. www.dukecard.duke.edu Click on *Get a Duke Card*. Then click on *Spouses*. Your Duke affiliated spouse will sponsor you for a card.
- **When you have received a unique ID number, go to the Duke Card Office** located 012 Telcom Building (lower level rear entrance on West Campus). New DukeCards are made Monday-Friday 8:00am to 6:00pm at this Card Office only. When you go to the Card Office:
 - ❑ Bring your spouse (who is affiliated with the university/medical center) and their Duke Card as well as proof of marriage (if you have it). If not, you will sign forms.
 - ❑ A Government Issued Photo ID (Passport)
 - ❑ \$5 Cash, Check, or Debit Card

Using the Recreation Centers at Duke. Once you have obtained a DukeCard you may sign up for a membership to the Duke Recreation Centers - Wilson Recreation Center on West Campus and Brodie Gym on East Campus. Sign up at the Card Office. LIBRARY CARDS

If you are not eligible for a DukeCard, library cards may be purchased at Perkins or Lilly Libraries. If you have a DukeCard, *there is no need to get a library card*, since library access is included with your DukeCard.

- \$100/year which gives you access to all the libraries including Ford (business), Goodson (law) & Medical Center Library.
